Proposed Domestic Abuse (Prevention) (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to make provision for the prevention of domestic abuse and improve support for those affected, including by requiring: those convicted of offences related to domestic abuse to provide information for a register; use of this information to prevent further harm; use of rehabilitation measures in relation to offences related to domestic abuse; collation and reporting of data related to domestic abuse; and domestic abuse education in schools.

The consultation runs from 29 August 2022 to 20 November 2022

I would also support more education and training for boys and young men to prevent the problem at source by tackling misogyny and toxic masculinity.

However, within the sex class of women, those who have disabilities, are pregnant or otherwise vulnerable are more likely to suffer violence. There are also very specific issues in relation to violence in same-sex relationships (fear of being 'outed'; not wanting to show our community in a bad light; for gay men, a belief that men don't suffer domestic violence) so all of these will need to be considered
