Proposed Domestic Abuse (Prevention) (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to make provision for the prevention of domestic abuse and improve support for those affected, including by requiring: those convicted of offences related to domestic abuse to provide information for a register; use of this information to prevent further harm; use of rehabilitation measures in relation to offences related to domestic abuse; collation and reporting of data related to domestic abuse; and domestic abuse education in schools.

The consultation runs from 29 August 2022 to 20 November 2022

I think the register needs to be a positive thing; helping to protect vulnerable partners but also enabling rehabilitation of perpetrators.

Rehabilitation is vital and should be mandatory otherwise there is no chance of changing people's behaviour patterns and the problem of domestic abuse will never have a chance of being solved.

There maybe contributory factors such as concern about finances and housing, mental health etc. So rehabilitation has to include far more than just anger management. It should include relationship skills, respect for others and self, stress

management, financial budgeting and assistance, informarion about services that are avaiable to offer help in times of stress, whether financial, housing or relational.
